WHY THIS STUDY?

AIM


To analyze and compare profitability differential among male and female operated broiler enterprises as measures to scale up economic opportunities and transform local economy

METHODOLOGY


- Study area is Abia state, Nigeria.
- Participants were 120 poultry farmers, comprising 60 male and 60 female respectively.
- Data collected with copies of questionnaires
- Analytically, multiple regression, paired Z-test statistics, profitability ratio and descriptive statistics were employed in the analysis.

RESULTS

Broiler production in Abia state was highly profitable across gender. From the result, every #1 spent in broiler production will generate #225 for both male and female farmers respectively.
